- 1 THE CLAY TOWNSHIP PHRAGMITES MANAGEMENT PLAN
- 2 CLAY TOWNSHIP, ST. CLAIR COUNTY, MICHIGAN, USA

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- 4 Section 1. DEFINITIONS.
- 5 "Advisory Board" means the Clay Township Phragmites Management Advisory
- 6 Board as established by the Clay Township Board.
- 7 "Person" means an individual, firm, corporation, association, partnership, limited
- 8 liability company, or other legal entity.
- 9 <u>"Phragmites"</u> or <u>"Phragmites plant"</u> means the invasive plant species with the
- 10 scientific name "Phragmites australis". Where used in this document the term
- 11 "Phragmites" or "Phragmites plant" does not include the native variety of
- 12 Phragmites.
- 13 "Plan", "Management Plan" or "Phragmites Management Plan" means this Clay
- 14 Township Phragmites Management Plan.
- 15 "Phragmites Treatment" means the control of Phragmites by best management
- practices including, but not limited to herbicide, cutting, burning or other methods,
- as prescribed by the Advisory Board and in accordance with all Local, State and
- 18 Federal laws.
- 19 "Phragmites Infestation" means a concentrated dense stand of phragmites
- 20 plants, determined by the Advisory Board to contain any of the following
- 21 characteristics:

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- It impacts wetland ecology by out-competing the native plants by creating a monoculture of reeds or reducing plant or animal diversity,
- It blocks or inhibits the flow of surface water in canals, drains or other open conveyances or adversely impacts the groundwater hydrology,
- It reduces land values or tourism by limiting access to or views of the lakes, rivers and canals, or can encourage blight conditions as defined in Clay Township Ordinances,
 - It presents a safety hazard by blocking or inhibiting visibility or access along roads or trails, at intersections or driveways or along navigable reaches of shoreline or waterways,
- Or it presents a fire hazard due to its proximity to dwellings, appurtenant structures or adjacent property as defined in Clay Township ordinances.
- 34 <u>"Program"</u> or <u>"Annual Program"</u> means the Annual Phragmites Management
- 35 Program described in Section 3H.

36 SECTION 2. PURPOSE AND SCOPE.

- 37 This Phragmites Management Plan was developed by the Clay Township
- 38 Phragmites Management Advisory Board and the Clay Township Board to
- 39 provide a plan for the Township to assist the citizens with procedures to receive
- 40 effective Phragmites treatment. By including all property owners within Clay
- Township that have a Phragmites infestation, this Phragmites Management Plan
- 42 will help maximize effectiveness of the Phragmites treatments, thereby helping to
- 43 better understand and manage Phragmites.

44 SECTION 3. COMPONENTS OF THE PHRAGMITES

45 MANAGEMENT PLAN

46 A. SURVEY

- 47 The Advisory Board should conduct a Phragmites survey to determine the extent
- 48 of Phragmites infestations in the Township,
- 49 This should include gathering, consolidating and interpreting data. To the extent
- 50 possible the survey should be conducted of all property within the Township for
- the purposes of identifying all parcels on which, and the extent to which,
- 52 Phragmites infestations exist. However, before entering onto a parcel to conduct
- the survey, the person doing the survey shall obtain written consent from the
- 54 property owner. When entry is not possible, an estimate of infestation should be
- 55 made using existing data, off-site visual inspection or remote imagery
- techniques. The survey data will be used to determine priority treatment areas
- and when combined with future survey data can be used to gage the success of
- the implementation of this Phragmites Management Plan.

59 B. PRIORITY TREATMENT AREAS

- 60 The Advisory Board should annually determine priority treatment areas based on
- the extent to which infestations impact the community, the availability of
- resources and the interest and cooperation of owners of infested properties.
- 63 Guidelines for determining the impact to the community will be those listed above
- 64 in the definition of "Phragmites Infestation."

65 C. COMMUNICATIONS

- 66 Communications should be established with the citizens and property owners of
- 67 Clay Township, permitting agencies, the research community and other active
- 68 phragmites management organizations.
- 69 The Advisory Board should hold an annual meeting to inform or update the
- 70 community on the Phragmites Management Plan and the Annual Phragmites
- 71 Management Program. This meeting should include the opportunity for the
- Advisory Board to gather input from the community regarding the Annual
- 73 Phragmites Management Program. The Advisory Board should publicize the

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- 74 availability and activities of the Phragmites Management Program through the
- use of signs, flyers, public access TV, the Internet, the Press and other available
- 76 forms of media.
- 77 The Advisory Board should maintain communications with Phragmites
- 78 management permitting agencies in order to assist property owners in
- 79 understanding and completing the permit process.
- 80 The Advisory Board should maintain communications with the Phragmites
- 81 management research community and other phragmites management
- organizations in order to bring information about the latest techniques in
- 83 Phragmites management back to the community. These communications should
- be in the form of personal communications, subscribing to publications and/or
- 85 member attendance at workshops and seminars.

86 D. EDUCATION

- 87 The Advisory Board should be responsible for educating the public regarding the
- affects of Phragmites infestations and for training the public on the latest
- methods of Phragmites management for purposes of health and safety.
- 90 Education and training should include, but not be limited to, workshops, personal
- 91 consultations, and the availability of reference materials.
- 92 The Advisory Board should use signs, flyers, public access TV, the Internet, the
- 93 Press and other available forms of media for educational and training purposes
- 94 and to publicize educational and training opportunities and to maximize public
- 95 awareness and involvement.
- 96 The Advisory Board should maintain a list of volunteers who are willing to help
- others in the community with education assistance in the management of their
- 98 Phragmites.

99 E. PERMITTING ASSISTANCE

- 100 The Advisory Board should assist property owners in obtaining required permits
- 101 for Phragmites management including herbicide treatments and cutting or
- burning. One method of providing this assistance should be the establishment of
- annual Township-wide permits obtained by the Township on behalf of all property
- owners wishing to manage the Phragmites on their property.
- 105 Property owners wishing to self-treat their parcels under the authority of the
- 106 Township-wide permits shall be required to attend Phragmites management
- training as established by the Advisory Board.
- 108 The Advisory Board should maintain a list of volunteers who are willing to help
- others in the community with permitting assistance in the management of their
- 110 Phragmites.

111 F. TREATMENT ASSISTANCE

- 112 The Advisory Board should assist and/or advise property owners on obtaining
- 113 services from reliable certified contractors for Phragmites management. As part
- of an Annual Phragmites Management Program the Township should arrange for
- a contractor to treat multiple properties under a group contract, thereby resulting
- in cost savings to the property owners who choose to participate. The
- 117 Township's existing ordinance on the establishment of Assessment Districts
- should be used as needed to assist property owners in this process.
- 119 The Advisory Board should assist and/or advise property owners on obtaining
- supplies and equipment for Phragmites management. Information should be
- 121 available at the Township Hall on sources for equipment and State approved
- 122 chemicals.
- 123 The Township should purchase equipment that could be loaned or rented to
- 124 property owners to be used in the management of Phragmites within the
- 125 community. This should also include the Township's arrangement for the annual
- 126 purchase of Phragmites management chemicals in bulk quantities for resale to
- 127 property owners at a location within the community.
- 128 The Advisory Board should maintain a list of volunteers who are willing to help
- others in the community with treatment assistance in the management of their
- 130 Phragmites.

131 G. FUNDING

- 132 The Advisory Board should investigate funding opportunities for ecosystem
- preservation and restoration and public education on those subjects.
- 134 The scope of the Annual Phragmites Management Program should be based on
- available funding each year. Funding sources may include, but not be limited to,
- the Clay Township annual budget, grants, donations, fees and income generated
- from the sale or rental of equipment or supplies for Phragmites management.
- 138 The Township may establish fees for persons who elect to be included in
- 139 components of the Annual Phragmites Management Program.
- 140 After the Advisory Board has approved which parcel or parcels shall be included
- in the Annual Phragmites Management Program, the Coordinator or other
- 142 Township authorized administrator acting on behalf of the Township, shall apply
- to the appropriate authorities for a permit or permits authorizing Phragmites
- treatment on the parcels included in the Program. Any fees associated with this
- process for such permit or permits shall be paid for as determined by the
- 146 Township Board.
- 147 The Township may establish Special Assessment Districts for the management
- 148 of Phragmites.

149 H. ANNUAL PHRAGMITES MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

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- 150 At the end of each calendar year The Advisory Board should develop an Annual
- 151 Phragmites Management Program for the coming year, to include a list of items
- 152 from the Phragmites Management Plan recommended for action by the
- 153 Township during that coming year. The items to be included should be based on
- the success of the previous year's Program and the availability of funds, staff and
- volunteers to administer the Program for the coming year. The Program
- recommendation should be submitted to The Township Board no later than
- 157 January each year.

158 I. PHRAGMITES MANAGEMENT COORDINATOR

- 159 Subject to annual funding, the Clay Township Board should establish an
- administrative position of Clay Township Phragmites Management Coordinator
- whose charge it is to oversee the implementation of the Phragmites Management
- 162 Plan and the Annual Phragmites Management Program. The duties and
- responsibilities of the Coordinator shall be as established by the Township
- Board. The candidate or candidates for the position shall be nominated by the
- Advisory Board and submitted to the Township Board for approval.
- 166 In the absence of a Phragmites Management Coordinator the Advisory Board
- may, at it's choosing, and with the approval of the Township Board, act as
- 168 Management Coordinator to oversee the implementation of the Phragmites
- 169 Management Plan and Annual Phragmites Management Program.

170 I. VOLUNTEERS

- 171 Persons who serve in any of the volunteer roles described in this Plan shall be
- 172 required to attend Phragmites management training as established by the
- 173 Advisory Board.

174 SECTION 4. COOPERTIVE AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY

175 OF ALGONAC & OTHER COMMUNITY PARTNERS

- 176 If a cooperative agreement is reached between Clay Township and the City of
- 177 Algonac or other community partners regarding a joint Phragmites Management
- 178 Plan, references within this document to Clay Township shall be modified to
- include The City of Algonac and other community partners as stated in the
- 180 cooperative agreement.
