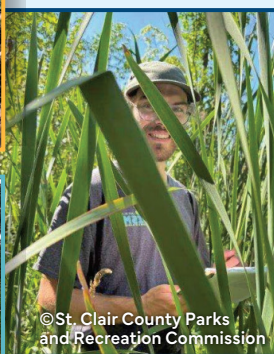
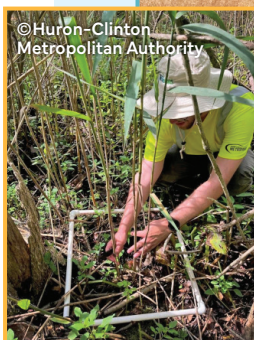




Phragmites Adaptive Management Framework Active Adaptive Management Program

Highlighting our 2025 AAMP Grant Recipients

In 2025, the *Phragmites* Adaptive Management Framework (PAMF) began its second cycle of the PAMF Active Adaptive Management Program (AAMP) to improve *Phragmites* management across the Great Lakes basin. In its second year, the GLPC awarded more than **\$314,000** to **21 organizations** in the Great Lakes region who, throughout the course of the year, will implement and report on management combinations critical to the PAMF model.



Grant recipients enrolled **71** separate management units that cover over **130 acres of land!**

In total, grant recipients are implementing **seven** different management combinations to treat *Phragmites*, with the combination of “**Glyphosate** (fall), **Rest** (winter), **Glyphosate** (spring/summer)” being the most popular.
